This has to be carefully managed and have very clear aims and objectives, with appropriate training for all administrators involved.

I think the legislation relating to treatment of addiction is inadequate, and that there are many individual organisations offering varying degrees of appropriate/inappropriate support. As a member of the public with an adult son who suffers from drug addiction, I have found the support available to be appalling. There is no true collaboration between agencies, and addicts are stigmatised by medical and social care services. Staffing is insufficient, proper training is required, and the government should have been adopting a proactive rather than reactive approach to tackling drugs harms and drugs deaths. There is also an increasingly dangerous problem with fake pills on the streets and in the homeless units and temporary accommodation in Scotland. These are readily available and life-threatening, due to the fact that they are created by cynical drug pushers, often in unhygienic conditions. My son almost died last year from taking them.

I think a lot more discussion at government level is required to ensure that such centres would be safe and offer hope to those who would be supported by them. Scotland's government is stuck in a destructive cycle of paying lip service to new drugs initiatives without then putting proper systems in place to allow the nation to really tackle our drugs problem.
